# DAILY LIFE IN ANCIENT KAUA`I

Archaeological Investigations at Miloli`i Valley

The Society welcomes Dr. Jennifer Kahn & Alan Carpenter who will present results and a photographic documentary of a collaborative archaeological research project at Miloli`i Valley on the Na Pali Coast of Kaua`i. Research focused on the site where a hale pili (now housed at Bishop Museum) was originally collected in the early 1900s.

"Miloli`i is a classic example of a Na Pali valley," said Dr. Jennifer Kahn, "characterized by relative isolation, permanent water supply, and vast evidence for pre-contact and historic Hawaiian utilization." After the hale pili site was refound, cleared and mapped, the field crew's excavations yielded rich and diverse evidence for ancient domestic activities. From these findings, our guest speakers will tell a story of the past lifeways of residents of Miloli`i and "the efforts it took for Hawaiians to live and flourish there."
